Another term has gone by so fast. The EAP For SACE Connect class had new students this term including students from Thailand and Vietnam.

Our students had the chance to speak more in English with each other and not only learn about Australian culture, but share about their own cultures as well.

Students not only improved their spoken and written English, but also grew in their personal confidence and academic maturity as the term progressed. Certainly, coming into a new country with a different language is not easy, but so far in the classroom, the students are doing really well.

Since we are a hybrid school, at the beginning of this term, we had a number of our students connecting into lessons online. Students learned about Sustainability for English for Humanities exploring the topics of volunteering and saving the Earth. The SACE Board Examinations

The SACE Board Examinations began this week and so far our students have sat Mathematical Methods, English as an Additional Language (EAL) and Essential Mathematics. These examinations proceeded without interruption thanks to well-organised students and staff. This year was the fist time the SACE Board has required the EAL examination to be completed online. The first e-exam went smoothly and students are congratulated for their preparation at learning the e-exam systems, having the correct examination lock down browser and for learning the computer functions needed to complete this examination. The students and systems provided for assessment integrity and we are very much looking forward to finding out their results soon.

Still to come, is the Specialist Mathematics examination on Wednesday next week. Students must be present at school by 8.30am and seated by 8.45am. This assessment begins at 9am.

I have been very impressed with the seriousness the students have taken this assessment and for their preparation in what has been a very busy and adaptable year.

COVID 19 SAFE



All parents and students, please be advised that there is a small COVID surge in Adelaide at the moment. While not alarming it's a timely reminder that everyone needs to take precaution to keep themselves and others safe.

If you or your child is ill, please stay at home.

Please see a medical professional and take a COVID test. PCR is a recommendation but any positive result from any testing method should be taken seriously and isolation and care will be required.

If ill, students should stay home from school until their symptoms ease and they feel well enough to join in again. We'll happily welcome you back.

During any time you are positive, please do not attend high risk settings such as unessential medical facilities or homes of the elderly as they and other groups are particularly vulnerable to this illness.

Wearing masks can minimise spread and rates of contraction and we recommend your child should have clean masks with them at school.

If you show symptoms but feel well, I know it's tempting to come to school.

Please do not.

Advise us of your positive result and get permission to join online from home. This is a reasonable adjustment for covid and we're happy to help you with this. Remember:

- Wash hands for as long as it takes to sing "Happy Birthday" and dispose of any tissues or other hygiene products carefully.
- Cough into the crook of your arm and try to not touch your face.
- Social distance of 1.5 metres is easily achievable most of the time in Adelaide and while on site at AIS. Always try to aim for this distance. The virus can travel, but it's heavy and won't travel far...which is why social distancing works!

Please look after yourselves and stay hydrated, sleep well, eat healthily and watch your personal hygiene.





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
