Welcome to the AIS 2026 prospectus. This is a landmark year for our school - one filled with promise, energy, and new beginnings.





Wellbeing and Personalised Learning

With years of experience working closely with students from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds, AIS understands our international students more because we recognise their unique challenges and tailor our support to meet their needs. Our school is committed to supporting the wellbeing of both international and domestic students, ensuring every learner feels safe, valued, and connected.

AIS promotes wellbeing through a holistic approach that supports the five key dimensions of student development: emotional, physical, social, spiritual, and mental.

To support students emotionally, each learner is assigned a dedicated Wellbeing Mentor who meets with them daily to check in, provide guidance, and assist with any personal or academic challenges. These relationships help build trust and ensure that students have someone they can rely on during their time at school.



Physical wellbeing is encouraged through daily routines and opportunities to stay active. In addition to regular physical education classes, AIS offers afterschool badminton sessions and organises weekend outdoor activities, such as hiking and team games.

Social wellbeing is developed through a wide range of opportunities, including after-school clubs led by students that provide meaningful chances to connect and build friendships. Excursions such as retreat days focus on team building and personal growth, helping students feel a strong sense of belonging.

AIS supports students' spiritual wellbeing by embedding our core values integrity, resilience, gratitude, aspiration, and inclusivity - into daily life. Students practice integrity through honesty, build resilience by overcoming challenges, and express gratitude to peers and mentors. They set goals that reflect aspiration and foster inclusivity by celebrating diversity. At the heart of these values is global citizenship, encouraging students to engage responsibly with the world through service and charity projects, helping them develop strong character and purpose.

To support mental wellbeing, AIS provides high-quality teaching and academic support, along with access to the STEER Tracking Tool, which helps identify patterns in students' emotional and cognitive development. This allows staff to deliver timely, personalised interventions and strategies to help students build resilience, confidence, and healthy thinking habits.

We also work closely with homestay families, recognising their essential role in creating a stable and supportive living environment. Through ongoing communication, we ensure that students receive consistent care both at home and at school.

Year 10 at AIS is an exciting year bridging middle and senior schooling. Our course offers a range of choices from the Australian National, SACE and Cambridge curricula. With Cambridge IGCSE curriculum at its core, the program is great for 15-year-olds who want a truly global experience.

At the centre of our Year 10 program is the subject IGCSE Global Perspectives. The heart of this subject is collaboration and human ingenuity - thinking, communicating, planning, acting, and reflecting on global, national, and local environmental and social issues.

In Year 10, you can take 5 IGCSE's, and an A-C pass will attract 20 SACE credits. Students typically take IGCSE's in Maths, English, or EAL, Global Perspectives, a Science Subject, and a language.

Year 10 students who want to study exciting subject material that widens and deepens knowledge enjoy IGCSE courses. Students take IGCSE's in November of Year 10 and can complete the Year with 100+ SACE credits.

In Year 11, Students can either continue with SACE or opt to join the two-year A-level program.

Why not study for IGCSE's at AIS at Twilight?

Our twilight courses run through the week, commencing at 5:00 pm and 7:30 pm, so you can earn extra credits outside of regular school and even extend yourself in more rigorous versions of subjects like Maths, Science, or Languages.



The South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE)

The South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) is a two-year study pathway through senior school. The SACE is completed by successfully engaging in compulsory and elective subjects. Fostering student agency and enabling students to thrive, SACE is recognised by all universities world-wide. Students leave the SACE able to meet their aspirations through university, vocational education, traineeships, in organisations and the workforce. SACE students are confident in their knowledge and abilities to communicate and connect with a wide range of people.

SACE balances academic rigour with achievability by offering a range of engaging subjects.

Stage 1 SACE consists of 2 semesters of learning. Students can choose single semester courses or whole year courses

Stage 2 students challenge themselves with their final year of high school. Studies in Stage 2 are engaging and rewarding, leading students to progress learning in their chosen fields.

Together, the SACE stages prepare students with the personal attributes, knowledge and capabilities to join the global community as young adults with purpose. Students study five subjects in Year 12.



Vocational Learning at AIS

Vocational Learning is popular with South Australian students. According to the SACE Board, 50% of all students graduating the SACE, do so with VET courses accounting for some of the learning. VET courses enable students to focus their learning in an area of interest such as, health, technology, business and a wide range of other specialisations. These courses provide a wonderful opportunity to engage with learning and develop their proficiency in more practical and interactive ways. These courses are enjoyable and achievable. Some students who are aiming to go to university do VET courses to broaden their work place skills which helps them gain part-time work while they study.


English for Academic Purposes (EAP)




EAP prepares students for the language demands of their courses. We have EAP for all age groups – taught by registered teachers. The curriculum design is informed from world-wide leading experts in TESOL.

Our language program is of the highest quality, it is age appropriate and organised by subject. Following content-based language acquisition methodology with text-based teaching strategies, the EAP program is designed with ACARA content descriptors for each subject. Students learn year level appropriate content to engage, and the language needed. In this way, we are well-placed to develop the students' language in the subjects needed to progress their learning.

Diagnostic Charts





With the EAP for Years 10 and 11, the students gain SACE Stage 1 credits – up to 40 Credits for the EAP. In addition, students in those year level EAPs gain 10 credits for the first SACE compulsory subject, EIF. Some students in this program also start their Background Language Speakers Year 11 courses, thereby getting a headstart to SACE.

Diagnostic testing is used for all students entering and transitioning from EAP programs. The diagnostic tool is aligned to South Australian first language speakers, enabling us to best place your child in appropriate level of learning.

Students in our program have a reputation for doing well in mainstream classrooms.

Learn English in your Middle Years aged 11-15

CRICOS Course Code: 083251E



The Middle Years Program at Adelaide International School is an exciting course for students aged between 12 and 15 years old. These students are in Years 7 to 9 where deeper subject-specific learning happens. Core to this learning are wellbeing guidance, the House System, and the Student Representative Council Activities.

This program is taught by subject and TESOL specialists who are registered teachers experienced in working with students in this age group.

This cohort of students learn English in all subjects, like their mainstream peers: Literacy, Mathematics, Science, Humanities, Health Science, and Physical Education. They also become familiar with SACE studies by preparing for the first SACE subject, Exploring Identities and Futures (EIF).

The Middle Years Program is designed with the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) Years 7 to 9 objectives and those objectives from lower year levels as necessary. These students are involved in developing general English, the English of the Australian classroom, and subject-specific learning. The theory behind the learning is content-based language learning using text-based methodology.

Entry Time: Term 1, 2, 3 and 4

Duration: Up to 1.5 Years

Language: Students should be interested in learning languages

Transitioning to Mainstream School

Diagnostics, capability, subject understanding and confidence, data, and observation are used to determine a Middle Year's students' readiness to transition to mainstream education.

Learn English in the Senior Years 10 & 11

CRICOS Course Code: 083251E



AIS has engaging English for Academic Purposes courses specifically for the Year 10 and 11 students. This cohort learns the subject-specific content and the language necessary, following content-based language learning theory. Our teachers are registered in South Australia and all are experienced subject specialists. Heads of Subject and the Director of Teaching and Learning oversee these programs.


To assess the language proficiency of students, diagnostic information is collected termly using the Learning English Achievement and Proficiency (LEAP) tool. Students need to demonstrate strong use of English for a range of purposes before they can progress with senior studies. Parents and other enrolling schools are provided with comprehensive reports of the students' progress.

In this course, students engage in the Year 10 subjects and begin collecting SACE Stage 1 credits. These students enroll in SACE Stage 1 Exploring Identities and Futures and Stage 1 Language other than English (LOTE). The LOTE subjects have an emphasis on translation and moving between Languages 1 and 2.

The most exciting opportunity in this course is the option to join Cambridge subjects at the IGCSE level. IGCSE English as an Additional Language is offered in this course.

With this carefully designed course, students can gain up to 60 SACE Stage 1 credits - a fantastic start to their senior schooling. Successful completion requires a high level of engagement with this intensive course. Students enjoy the Wellbeing lessons, House competitions and co-curricular sporting activities.

Scholarships



Each year, Adelaide International School offers a limited number of academic scholarships to eligible students.

- Scholarships are based on full course tuition fees.
- Scholarships are awarded based on individual merit and not all applicants will receive scholarships.
- Scholarships are awarded to applicants who best meet the application criteria.
- Scholarships range from 25 50% of tuition fees.
- A scholarship in excess of 50% will only be granted in exceptional circumstances.
- Scholarships do not apply to any fees other than tuition fees. Uniforms, Homestay fees, Material fees, are not subject to a scholarship discount.
- Fee payment terms and conditions apply to scholarship holders.

Criteria

The following criteria applies to scholarship candidates:

Special Award

EVIDENCE: Letter from school principal including information about the unique circumstances that merits consideration for scholarship.

Academic Performance

Strong academic achievement in one or more subjects. Passing grades in English are essential.

EVIDENCE: The two most recent school reports, awards, and other achievements.

Character & Community

EVIDENCE: Certificates (if appropriate), or a letter of commendation from a teacher, school principal or community member.

Study Tours Adelaide based cultural & study program

Adelaide International School offers study tours to international students who are interested in improving their English language skills and experiencing local culture. English language courses are personalised for each group based on their pre-existing English language levels. Local excursions and activities are integrated into the program, including visits to local private schools. Study Tours allow international students the opportunity to observe the Australian education system, experience local culture, and develop their English language skills through Adelaide International School's coordinated activities. They are a fantastic experience for any student who is contemplating studying in Australia, or who wants to immerse themselves in Australian culture.

Guardianship Support

AIS recommends parents consider registering with a recognised third-party provider of quality and reliable guardianship service to international students. AIS recommends either the Student Guardian Service (SGS) or International Student Alliance (ISA).

Student Guardian Service (SGS)



SGS has worked extensively with local schools in Adelaide, including AISA schools, to provide comprehensive welfare arrangements for international students under the age of 18. SGS's custodial team members all hold the mandatory 'Responding to Abuse and Neglect' certificate required by the Australian Government.

SGS will allocate a support staff member who is bilingual in English and the student's native language, so they can best support the student. SGS also provides timely communication with parents and homestays. SGS's 24/7 service includes airport pick-up and drop-off, accommodation arrangements, if required, and coordination, local briefings, homestay visits, holiday arrangements, emergency assistance support, as well as support with school meetings. SGS assists with finding appropriate counselling advice.


